About CashBack for Communities

CashBack for Communities is a Scottish Government programme which takes funds recovered from the proceeds of crime and invests them into free activities and programmes for young people across Scotland. Inspiring Scotland is the delivery partner for the CashBack for Communities programme, appointed in July 2012.

- CashBack invests monies seized from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 back into our communities.
- Since 2008 the Scottish Government has committed £92 million to CashBack / community initiatives, funding community activities and facilities largely, but not exclusively, for young people.
- CashBack supports all 32 Local Authorities across Scotland.
- Sporting and recreational activities / culture / mentoring and employability / community projects.
- CashBack has delivered nearly 2 million activities and opportunities for young people.
- Phase 3 of CashBack runs to end March 2017 and is focused on positive outcomes for young people.



CashBack for Communities: Aims

CashBack activities:

- Use the proceeds of crime in a positive way to expand young people's horizons and increase their opportunities to develop their interests and skills in an enjoyable, fulfilling and supportive way.
- Are open, where possible, to all children and young people, while focusing resources in those communities suffering most from antisocial behaviour and crime.
- Seek to increase levels of participation to help divert young people away from 'at risk' behaviour, and will aim to increase the positive long-term outcomes for those who take part.

It should be noted that CashBack partners may have worked with some of the same young people over a number of years. Therefore the total annual activity and opportunity figures might not directly correlate to the number of individual young people who have been involved with CashBack.

Examples of CashBack funded activities up to 2016

The **Small Grants Scheme** consortium has been a beneficiary of CashBack funding in Stirling since 2008 and this has included supporting Boys Brigade, Girlguiding Scotland, Scouts Scotland activities across the area.

YouthLink Scotland, through the Youth Work Fund, has supported capacity of young people and youth work organisations. Examples in the Local Authority include Tain Youth Café, High Life Highland, TYKES, Ormlie Community Association, Brora Community Youth Theatre, The Place, Highland Community Skate Parks, and Raigmore Youth Club.

Creative Scotland, through their CashBack for Creativity fund, has supported organisations in the area including Eden Court Theatre to support delivery of digital, music and dance based activities. Another activity funded was An Lanntair which allows young Hebrideans to work with contemporary dancers to a dance film and performance.

Prince's Trust Development Awards have been presented though CashBack funding in the area since 2008 and includes supporting young people on the path to employability. Examples of the support provided includes a PC for college course, musical equipment, and beauty therapy courses.

Boxing Scotland provided support and coaching facilities to young people in the area from 2012 to 2014 at Highland Boxing Academy at Forge Gym in Inverness and also in Lochleven. The programme combined fun, games, exercise and the chance to develop non-contact boxing skills as well as core values such as fair play and self-discipline.

Basketballscotland has supported a number of clubs in the area, including Highland Bears, Inverness City, Fortrose Fury, Elgin Eagles, Northern Heat, Thurso Tigers, Lochaber Lions, Gairloch Stags and Oban Towers providing coaching assistance and organising activities and courses for young people in the area.

Scottish FA runs a School of Football initiative at Charleston Academy one of 26 across Scotland. A social and academic programme, the 32 pupils involved receive 1 hour per day of activities within their curriculum. The Girls and Women's

programme has supported a tournament including participation from Brora, Orkney, Caithness, Western Isles and Inverness. The SFA also manages the Midnight League programme which has activity provided at Fort William, Wick and Grantown.

Scottish Rugby Union runs broad participation in Highland and the CashBack funding has enabled part funding of two full time rugby development officer at Highland and Caithness Rugby Clubs. The G4S Street Rugby programme has been popular in the area and has been held at Gairloch, Smithton, Hilton, Beauly, and Dornie. In 2012 Lochaber RFC were awarded £40,000 from CashBack to upgrade their pitch drainage.

Scottish Sports Futures have completed a number of years of CashBack funded delivery in Inverness (Merkinch and Hilton) Nairn and Dingwall and surrounding areas where the Twilight Basketball programme has been delivered. Jump2lt, the programme which provides interactive primary school health and citizenship programme, has been very active in Highlands with some 10 Primary Schools supported by SSF.



Highland – CashBack Outcomes: Case Studies



Michael Matheson MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Justice, visited young people in Highland to find out more about the Young People Take the Lead initiative which is funded by CashBack for Communities. The young people he met were part of the Youth Advisory Group in Highland and he participated in a creative consultation workshop, which focused on engaging and inspiring young people to take the lead in their own communities.

The session was filled with energisers, table discussions and exercises to explore why and how young people can take the lead in their groups, projects and organisations. During the session young people built the skills to become leaders and decision makers.

SACRO's Moray Young Persons' Supported Accommodation is in Elgin and funded through the Creative Scotland CashBack scheme. The project provides supported accommodation, advice and support to vulnerable young homeless people between the ages of 16 and 24. SACRO approached Eden Court to provide film and music workshops for the young people to help to engage them in a positive activity which would build their confidence, self-esteem and motivation. Sessions ran over a period of 6 weeks. During the sessions, one young women, C, was particularly enthusiastic, and the Eden Court staff suggested that she get involved in some further arts activities. The young woman expressed an interest in Musical Theatre, but could not afford to pay for mainstream classes. Eden Court has enabled C to attend the mainstream Musical Theatre classes (through Cashback for Communities funding) which lead to London Academy of Music & Dramatic Art Qualifications. As a result of attending, C has developed her skills, confidence and motivation. She now hopes to go to college to study Drama. In the meantime she is developing her skills through volunteering – she now volunteers at Eden Court as a support worker at the children's Musical Theatre Classes.

Moniack Mhor - House of Stories	Moniack Mhor provide a broad range of creative writing opportunities for young people from all backgrounds. Its multi-tiered approach supports young people working on an individual basis, such as through the forum as a digital medium or through one to one mentoring. It also enables access to wider group based activities such as writing clubs. The project provides clear pathways for progression for all involved and allows individuals to be engaged on a variety of levels. Each area of activity includes a 'taster' session for those who show an interest.
