About CashBack for Communities

CashBack for Communities is a Scottish Government programme which takes funds recovered from the proceeds of crime and invests them into free activities and programmes for young people across Scotland. Inspiring Scotland is the delivery partner for the CashBack for Communities programme, appointed in July 2012.

- CashBack invests monies seized from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 back into our communities.
- Since 2008 the Scottish Government has committed £92 million to CashBack / community initiatives, funding community activities and facilities largely, but not exclusively, for young people.
- CashBack supports all 32 Local Authorities across Scotland.
- Sporting and recreational activities / culture / mentoring and employability / community projects.
- CashBack has delivered nearly 2 million activities and opportunities for young people.
- Phase 3 of CashBack runs to end March 2017 and is focused on positive outcomes for young people.



CashBack for Communities: Aims

CashBack activities:

- Use the proceeds of crime in a positive way to expand young people's horizons and increase their opportunities to develop their interests and skills in an enjoyable, fulfilling and supportive way.
- Are open, where possible, to all children and young people, while focusing resources in those communities suffering most from antisocial behaviour and crime.
- Seek to increase levels of participation to help divert young people away from 'at risk' behaviour, and will aim to increase the positive long-term outcomes for those who take part.

Examples of CashBack funded activities up to 2016

The **Small Grants Scheme** consortium has been a beneficiary of CashBack funding in Edinburgh since 2008 and this has included supporting Boys Brigade, Girlguiding Scotland, Scouts, Girls Brigade and Youth Club activities across the area.

YouthLink Scotland, through the Youth Work Fund, has supported capacity of young people and youth work organisations. Examples in the Local Authority include the Ripple project, Edinburgh City Youth Café, Café K, Niddrie Centre, Beyond Gender Youth Project, Pilmeny Development project and Muirhouse Youth Development Group.

Creative Scotland, through their CashBack for Creativity fund, has supported many organisations in the area including Dance Base, Screen Education Edinburgh, North Edinburgh Arts, CP Productions, Verden Studios, Citadel Youth Centre and Dance Ihayami.

Boxing Scotland delivered weekly boxing coaching from June 2012 in Leith Victoria Amateur Boxing Club and Meadowbank Sports Centre, one of the 'flagship' clubs in Edinburgh.

Prince's Trust Development Awards have been used to support a number of young people in the area including funding to purchase IT equipment, driving lessons and course fees.

Scottish FA run School of Football programmes at Gracemount High School, St. Augustine's and Forrester Academy and Craigroyston High School. The delivery in each of the schools comes from 2 City of Edinburgh coaches and Spartans Football Club coaches. Pupils involved receive 1 hour per day activities within their curriculum. The SFA also manages the Midnight League programme which takes place on Friday nights at Leith Academy and Forrester High School. The SFA has also been actively encouraging participation from BME, working with a range of diverse communities such as African, Asian, Sudanese, Polish, Sikh and many multi-cultural groups. They have had success in the development of a new team called 'Bengal Tigers' who cater for the Bangladeshi community in Edinburgh.

Scottish Rugby Union runs broad participation activities in Aberdeen and the CashBack funding has enabled part funding of seven full-time rugby club development officers at Edinburgh Leisure, BATs RFC, Forrester RFC, Lismore RFC, Boroughmuir RFC, Murrayfield RFC and RHC RFC. These posts are responsible for the delivery of the broad participation

programme and street rugby in the area. The Street Rugby has been delivered at Ainslie Park (near Pilton) and Westburn Park in Wester Hailes as well as Kirkliston, Portobello and Drumbrae. Trinity Academy has been a School of Rugby since 2011. In 2012 Currie RFC was awarded funding from the CashBack Rugby facilities fund to redevelop changing accommodation at Malleny Park to help accommodate the growing number of boys and girls playing rugby in the area and Lismore RFC were awarded funding in 2011 to develop new rugby pitches at the Inch Community Hub.

Scottish Sports Futures have operated their Jump2lt programme in primary schools across the city including St Francis Primary, St Ninian's Primary, St John's Primary, St Catherine's Primary, Niddrie Mill Primary, Newcraighall Primary, Sighthill Primary, Clovenstone Primary, Canalview Primary, and St Mary's (Leith) Primary. The pupils learnt about how to lead a healthy lifestyle including facts about the dangers of smoking and drinking alcohol. The diversionary Twilight basketball programme has also been delivered over Friday nights at Meadowbank.

The **Link Up** project supported by Inspiring Scotland and the CashBack programme until 2014, facilitates, supports and evidences ways that individuals and communities can build their social connections and help and trust each other. In Edinburgh the Link Up operation is based in Leith and another in Muirhouse in partnership with Pilmeny Development project, MILAN and Friends of Dalmeny Street Park. Key activities previously included Pop-up Playground Café involving families connected with Lorne Primary School; Dalmeny Street Park Clean-Ups; Cooking Nights for a broad cross-section of local people; and a 'Make our Neighbourhood Beautiful Project'.



Edinburgh – CashBack Outcomes: Case Studies

CashBack has made a huge difference to the lives of young people. We have captured information on individual case studies for CashBack partners which demonstrate the impact delivery activities have had to those participating. A was a 18 year old male who had left college and was working with a local youth agency (the Mansion Edinburgh – Dunedin Canmore) on activity agreement programme. While completing a sports leadership qualification with the Mansion, he was referred onto the CashBack funded **Action for Children's Positive Choices Programme**. A was confident from the start and eager to complete the programme and with the support of AFC seek out development opportunities. After the initial assessment, it was determined that the main area of support which was required was employability skills, but mainly help with finding suitable opportunities and completing the application process. As a result of attending the programme A now understands how to find out about suitable opportunities, has a clearer understanding of his skills and abilities, is building strong relationships with support workers and completing workplace visits with peers. A has been put forward for a training course and community jobs Scotland post.

Funded through the CashBack **Small Grants Scheme**, the Edinburgh South Cluster Youth Group has around 40-50 young people attending the group. The group put their CashBack grant towards an adventure weekend at Benmore, Argyll. The group raised three quarters of the money needed for the weekend, and the CashBack grant helped them to reach their target. This meant that the trip was more affordable for families. The aim of the trip was for young people to experience an adventure weekend, to build and strengthen trust and friendships, to build confidence levels, and to improve behaviour. Over 40 young people, supported by 13 leaders, participated in the trip which was felt to be a huge success.

J always had an interest in volunteering. 'I first started when I was 16 helping at local youth clubs and I really enjoyed myself. When attending the local community bingo evening, I was approached by a local **Link Up** Development Worker who asked what I thought was missing from the area. I explained that there was a real need to develop a supportive social space for people impacted by drug and alcohol issues in Muirhouse. For people with drug and alcohol problems, there was just no place for them to go.

Link Up took on board my suggestion and I was soon helping to recruit volunteers for a weekly café where local people affected by drug and alcohol dependency could drop by, have a bite to eat and keep off the streets. Now the group meets weekly in the local community hall where between 6 to12 local men and women get together in the newly-formed Community Shop. People can take part in a range of activities, have a healthy meal, relax and chat to their peers. The Muirhouse cafe provides a meeting place where people are encouraged and supported to organise and carry out their own activities and to take responsibility for the running of the cafe. It aims to promote social skills by working together. Also, it provides a place where they can have the confidence to be themselves. Link Up and CashBack for Communities has really benefited the community here in Muirhouse and I am glad to be a part of the positive work going on here'.

AR was keen to do the **Street Soccer (Scotland)** Football Works course in Edinburgh however her lack of confidence prevented her attending when it first started. After speaking with the Change Worker she managed to gain the courage to attend for the first time. She thoroughly enjoyed it. AR previously had been thrown out of school and reprimanded in a secure unit, she also attended Panmure School (Street Soccer has also worked with this school providing sessions for the pupils). She informed staff that she has never completed any course or programme and had never written an essay. She has now written two essays and even taken written work home to complete as homework. She has improved her football skills and her fitness and confidence is growing daily.

L was the chairman, founder, coach, coordinator, driver and a few other roles associated with the Polish football project called Goal Academy. It began in 2008 as a project to provide coaching for diverse community groups (predominantly Polish) in Edinburgh. Over the course of the last 5 years the project had grown to a couple of sites with approximately 100 young members. When the **Scottish FA Football Equity** project started the Development Officer engaged with L and together they pushed the groups forward again and created competitive teams for the young people to play more regularly in a constituted and controlled league environment. This regular football was a great boost for the club and its members. With the support of the SFA Development Officer, L had been demonstrating excellent development and leadership skills and was successful in applying for the vacant Development Officer for East / North region.

Project Name	Description The purpose of CashBack for Creativity is to provide access to high quality experiential opportunities in all arts forms via three routes: (i) an Open Arts Fund for small grant awards of up to £10k for youth arts groups; (ii) a Strategic Fund for larger arts groups who focus on young engagement and employability; and (iii) a training and education route through College networks looking at engaging young people in vital skills required for the textile and arts sectors. Screen Education Edinburgh - SEE Cashback for Creativity Programme	SEE activities will provide educational drama filmmaking programmes for young people in the 12-19 age range in the South East of Scotland, prioritising young people living in areas of multiple deprivation. This programme of activity will provide cultural experiences, accredited qualifications and progression opportunities for young people who would not normally have access to such, for reasons of social or economic exclusion. Working in areas of multiple deprivation and in partnership with a broad range of schools, youth, community and equalities organisations we provide one-day taster events, followed by longer introductory and intermediary filmmaking education programmes. Initial taster opportunities take place locally, minimising barriers to participation, with further progression available through longer projects and through trainee schemes. Dance Base – Great Feats	The Great Feats project delivers high quality dance activities to young people at risk. It fully supports participants by providing pastoral care, a healthy eating programme and support with further education / employment. The Great Feats programme encompasses a fully integrated service delivery approach involving: dance activities, a pastoral care programme to support participants, providing personal tutors to support the young people and implementing a healthy eating programme. This project is transformational and aims to improve the lives of excluded young people by developing their personal, social, creative and educational skills. To ensure participants who are most in need are identified, we work in close partnership with organisations such as youth organisations (the Junction and Edinburgh Young Carers) and the City of Edinburgh Council. North Edinburgh Arts - Teen Scream	Teen Scream will be a high quality youth magazine club which aims to inspire and offer an appropriate vehicle to drive young people's vision, views and opinions forward within their local community. Researched, developed and written by local young people (10-18 years) living in Muirhouse, North Edinburgh, the colour editorial will be produced 7 times over the 37-week project (42 hours face to face time) with photos, relevant articles and features created in structured weekly workshops. The project will deliver a programme of activities in two areas of deprivation in Edinburgh (Muirhouse and Wester Hailes). The project will provide the participants with weekly sessions, giving them the opportunity to develop new creative skills, build their confidence and self-esteem (supporting emotional wellbeing), improve concentration, and raise cultural awareness. Tinderbox Project	The project forms a new music hub and creative collective for young people in North Edinburgh, helping to engage young people out of work and education, from areas of deprivation and those struggling with homelessness and chaotic life circumstances. 	The project would allow open access, weekly drop-in Music Hub and collective of young people in North Edinburgh Arts Centre in Muirhouse, which we hope to make an ongoing and stable resource for young people in the area. The Frontiers Music Collective is open access and free of charge. There is an ongoing apprenticeship scheme where young people gain experience leading workshops, organising projects and events, and creatively developing new music & ideas. Muirhouse Youth Development Group	Offers a circus skills programme, which builds on acrobatic and movement skills young people may already be interested in from urban street-dance activities such as parkour and free-running. The project will match experienced and highly regarded circus trainers with young people and provide a programme of weekly activities to develop essential skills. Risks are controlled and progressive, young people have the opportunity to challenge themselves and discover what they are capable of. Over the course of a 40-week period, skills will be developed through evening and weekend sessions, culminating in young people staging a public spectacular to an audience both in an enclosed theatre space and the streets of Muirhouse itself. Southside Community Centre Association	Young people will be involved in a series of professionally led and supported workshops.
