About CashBack for Communities

CashBack for Communities is a Scottish Government programme which takes funds recovered from the proceeds of crime and invests them into free activities and programmes for young people across Scotland. Inspiring Scotland is the delivery partner for the CashBack for Communities programme, appointed in July 2012.

- CashBack invests monies seized from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act 2002 back into our communities.
- Since 2008 the Scottish Government has committed £92 million to CashBack / community initiatives, funding community activities and facilities largely, but not exclusively, for young people.
- CashBack supports all 32 Local Authorities across Scotland.
- Sporting and recreational activities / culture / mentoring and employability / community projects.
- CashBack has delivered nearly 2 million activities and opportunities for young people.
- Phase 3 of CashBack runs to end March 2017 and is focused on positive outcomes for young people.



CashBack for Communities: Aims

CashBack activities:

- Use the proceeds of crime in a positive way to expand young people's horizons and increase their opportunities to develop their interests and skills in an enjoyable, fulfilling and supportive way.
- Are open, where possible, to all children and young people, while focusing resources in those communities suffering most from antisocial behaviour and crime.
- Seek to increase levels of participation to help divert young people away from 'at risk' behaviour, and will aim to increase the positive long-term outcomes for those who take part.

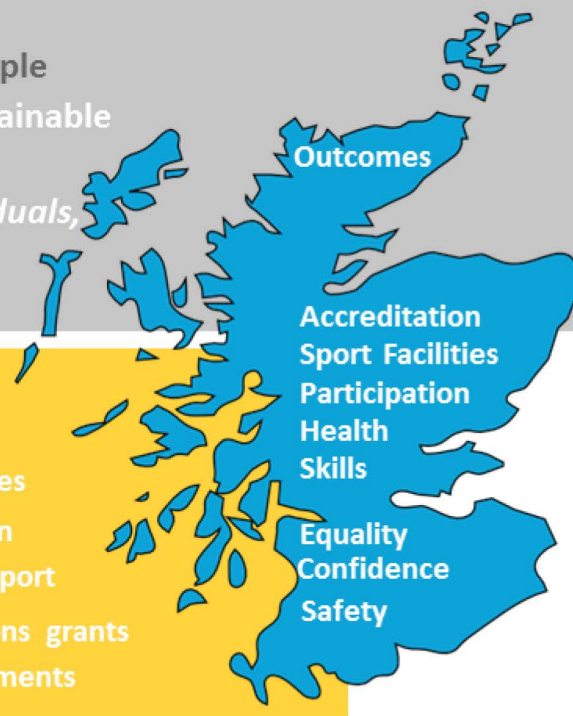

Activity number represents the number of activities and opportunities that young people have taken advantage of as a result of CashBack funding. It should be noted that CashBack partners may have worked with some of the same young people over a number of years. Therefore the total annual activity and opportunity figures might not directly correlate to the number of individual young people who have been involved with CashBack.



Historic CashBack funding (2008 -2016)

Examples of CashBack funded activities up to 2016

Amateur Boxing Scotland supported the Livingston and District Boxing Club which over 20 young people attended weekly. The programme started in July 2012 and was funded by CashBack until 2014.

YouthLink Scotland, through the Youth Work Fund, has supported capacity of young people and youth work organisations. Examples in the Local Authority include Firefly Arts, Linlithgow Young People project, Children 1st and YWCA Scotland.

Prince's Trust Development Awards have been used to support a number of young people in the area including funding towards completing a Security Industry Authority licence.

Basketballscotland has supported 2 grassroots basketball clubs in the area, including West Lothian Wolves club as well as running coaching and broad participation programmes for young people.

Scottish FA runs a School of Football initiative with Inveralmond Academy one of 26 across Scotland. A social and academic programme, the 32 pupils involved receive 1 hour per day activities within their curriculum. The SFA also manages the Midnight League programme which has activities at Xcite Sports Centres, Blackburn Community Centre and Armadale Academy as well as Street Football at Craigsfarm Astro.

Scottish Rugby Union has funded two full time rugby development officers at Livingston RFC and Linlithgow RFC who are responsible for delivery of broad participation programme and street rugby in the area. Whitburn Academy has been part of the School of Rugby programme since 2011.



West Lothian – CashBack Outcomes: Case Studies

CashBack has made a huge difference to the lives of young people. We have captured information on individual case studies for CashBack partners which demonstrate the impact delivery activities have had to those participating. A young person was a recipient of a **Prince's Trust Development Award**:

"I heard about the Development Awards that CashBack for Communities funded through Princes Trust on Gumtree.

"I'd been struggling to get by and couldn't get work. I was depressed. No job and no money. Princes Trust showed me how to make a good CV, and set out my goals to get a trade.

"I got an award which helped me go on a building course and I have since become an Apprentice Joiner. I love it, have made good friends got to experience different trades and earned my CSCS card which helps me for any trade working on a building site.

As part of the Scottish FA's **School of Football** initiative funded by CashBack, all S1 pupils have been introduced to technical skill testing this school year. This is a new experience for each of them. The pupils have been given four creative player skills and equipment to practice with at home and are given the responsibility to practice the skills as often as possible, in turn pupils are tested in class time each term with results displayed on the SoF notice board. The aim is for pupils to take responsibility for improving their own level of skill in order to improve their test scores term on term. Positive behavioural changes have been seen in particular with S1 pupil DS. In the early part of the school year D was displaying disruptive behaviour in classes and was becoming easily distracted, resulting in him being placed on school report. In recent weeks he has shown a much greater level of concentration in classes, greater focus on listening to instructions and is now capable of carrying out a variety of task by himself or in a group without becoming easily distracted or distracting others. He is convinced that this is as a result of the School of Football initiative and the discipline and enjoyment this has brought and which has helped to improve his overall attitude.

Screen Education Edinburgh - SEE Cashback for Creativity Programme	SEE activities will provide educational drama filmmaking programmes for young people in the 12-19 age range in south east Scotland, prioritising young people living in areas of multiple deprivation. This programme of activity will provide cultural experiences, accredited qualifications and progression opportunities for young people who would not normally have access to such as for reasons of social or economic exclusion. Working in areas of multiple deprivation and in partnership with a broad range of schools, youth, community and equalities organisations we will provide one-day taster events, followed by longer introductory and intermediary filmmaking education programmes. Initial taster opportunities will take place locally, minimising barriers to participation, with further progression available through longer projects and through trainee schemes. 	<p>Firefly will work closely with local partners, behavioural and disability services to ensure that participants with additional support needs can participate fully and equitably. The project will address existing access and transport issues through generating innovative, linked and partnered arts activity in a range of cultural and community venues. While recognising the significance of locally-based activity, A Word in Your Ear will aim to establish regional events and digital networks to enable participants, their families and community partners to forge collaborative links with the wider arts community, cultural events and creative industries.</p> <p><i>Firefly Arts will continue to be funded in 2016/17</i></p>	
Dance Ihayami	<p>The project creatively engages hard-to-reach young people in high quality Indian arts experiences by using a combination of dance, music, and theatrics, as well as the supporting activities of costume, lighting design and visual artistry. The programme will target at risk, vulnerable young people, and young people with additional support needs. The project will provide the participants with weekly stimulating session, giving them the opportunity to develop a new skill, build their confidence and self-esteem, improve concentration, and raise awareness of another culture. Programme content will include Indian dance, south Indian martial arts, development of narrative, storyboarding, photography, henna, visual artistry, lighting design, costume design, and performance technical support. 5 young members of Ihayami Fusion (Dance Ihayami's youth dance group) will be involved in the design and delivery of the sessions, and they will be using this to achieve their Silver Level Arts Award. Their role will be to assist the lead instructor, and also act as peer support to participants, young people having people near their own age to relate to. The project participants themselves will be given the opportunity to achieve their Bronze Level Arts Award as part of this project.
